


Highlighting Virtual Critical Care During COVID-19 at Atrium Health

Critical care clinicians are resilient. However, their resiliency is being tested during the current COVID-19 pandemic. Issues pertaining to staffing, keeping clinicians safe and sustaining a high level of care through this intense situation is causing the need for innovative problem solving. One such method includes leveraging the skills and accessibility a tele-ICU provides.

Atrium Health (AH) is a large, not-for-profit healthcare system headquartered in Charlotte, NC, with over 55,000 employees serving nearly 40 hospitals in North Carolina, South Carolina, and Georgia. Included in this hospital system is a tele-ICU, called Virtual Critical Care (VCC) that has been providing supportive clinical services in 10 hospitals and 16 intensive care units (ICU) for more than seven years. The VCC is comprised of 39 nurses, all of which are CCRN certified; 3 virtual respiratory therapists; 3 ePharmacists board certified in critical care; 82 board certified intensivists and 10 unit coordinators. Their operations staff consists of an operations director, nurse manager, 2 program coordinators, 2 staff assistants and dedicated information and analytics services. Through the use of real-time, highdefinition 2-way audio and video communication, the highly experienced clinicians that work at the VCC provide additional care to the more than 335 critical care beds in the healthcare system.



While continuing the high-quality, outcome-focused patient care the VCC is known to provide, they shifted some of their attention to provide much needed clinician-focused support. VCC nursing and virtual respiratory therapy workflows were modified to include additional virtual rounding of COVID-19 positive patients. During this rounding, VCC teammates are able to assess the patient and provide real-time feedback as they look at everything from intravenous sites and infusions to ventilator and equipment settings.

Using technology, the VCC teammates lessen the amount of time bedside clinicians spend in the patient's room, thus reducing exposure and conserving valuable personal protection equipment (PPE).

To reduce the risk of exposure or quarantine of VCC clinicians, home workstations were provided to about 82% of the team thus ensuring robust VCC support would always be available. And for high-risk bedside teammates, 10 nurses and respiratory therapists were welcomed to the VCC to bolster staff while continuing to use their clinical expertise. The VCC pharmacists obtained temporary licensure in Georgia to provide physician support during rapid implementation of VCC services at 3 rural facilities. They also collaborated with other critical care pharmacists across the system to leverage an emergency protocol to optimize medication therapy and expand hours of coverage.



At the bedside, VCC technology was used to allow more than 300 clinicians access to patients remotely which reduced exposure to the virus while leveraging the physician pool to cover more patients throughout the healthcare system. Nearly 75 mobile carts were added to critical care units throughout the system, allowing for the expansion of VCC coverage to newly opened surge units, ensuring continuous support in the event of equipment failure and protecting members of the IAS team from potential exposure with repair of faulty equipment.

Preparing for a crisis management scenario, VCC demonstrated versatility in the delivery of quality patient care. As the community continues to manage peaks in COVID-19 patients and monitors for surges in patients during the fall, the adaptability of the VCC and its clinicians continues to support the bedside's overall patient care strategy.


Committee Spotlight
